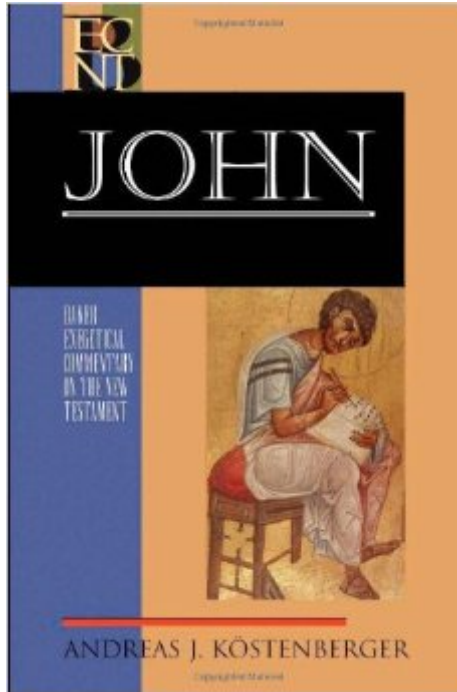

## Synopsis

Andreas J.
